SIDEWALK REGULATIONS NOW IN EFFECT FOR SUMMIT TOWNSHIP

Ordinance 2013-01 was adopted on November 18, 2013. The Ordinance provides all of the rules and regulations for the installation and maintenance of sidewalks. While a large portion of our Township does not have or require sidewalks at this time; the more recently developed portions are required to install sidewalks in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and must keep them properly maintained.

The nuts and bolts of the new regulations include where and why sidewalks are required:

- In all new commercial developments.
- In all new major residential developments where the lot width is 80' or less; if sidewalks exist in adjacent
 developments; or, are needed to provide access to community facilities like schools, shopping areas and
 recreation areas.

The Ordinance also provides for the proper location of sidewalks and how the sidewalks are to be constructed (i.e. sub-base, thickness, width, slope, etc.). To insure the sidewalks get installed correctly, the Township requires a bond that is held until the sidewalk inspected and found to be in compliance with the Ordinance.

MOST IMPORTANT FOR SUMMIT PROPERTY OWNERS ... the Ordinance requires that you (not the Township) are responsible for keeping the existing sidewalks in good repair and FREE OF ALL OBSTRUCTIONS, INCLUDING SNOW, ICE AND DEBRIS. What does this mean? Do you have to be out there shoveling continuously? In a word – NO! The ordinance states that all accumulation of snow and ice of a depth in excess of two (2) inches must be removed with 24 hours after the precipitation stops. This does not mean that every time the snow gets to 2 inches you have to be out there. It means that after the snow stops (even if it doesn't stop until there is a foot or more!) you must clear the snow within 24 hours. When you clear the walk it must be cleared to a width of 36" so that a wheelchair can pass.

If a property owner fails to comply with the Ordinance, the Township will notify the owner and, if proper repair or maintenance does not occur, the Township can perform the task and the property owner will be liable for any cost.

These new requirements are necessary to protect all existing property owners from paying for the cost of keeping Summit Township compliant with ADA requirements. We want to insure Summit doesn't find itself in the same situation as the City of Erie and Millcreek Township. Their residents were recently forced to pay for millions of dollars in improvements along Peach Street to bring sidewalks into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Winter Driving.

For this issue of the newsletter, we were going to write about the increase in traffic fines, primarily to help pay for roads and bridges. However, that seems a bit depressing and not very useful. With the weather we've been having, we decided to write about safe winter driving. Severe weather can be both frightening and dangerous for automobile travel. Please drive with caution in this extreme weather we've been having. The following tips are offered for winter driving.

General winter driving tips:

- Avoid driving while you're fatigued. Getting the proper amount of rest before taking on winter weather tasks reduces driving risks.
- Never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- Make certain your tires are properly inflated.
- Never mix radial tires with other tire types.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze-up.
- If possible, avoid using your parking brake in cold, rainy and snowy weather.
- Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface (wet, ice, sand).
- Always look and steer where you want to go.
- Use your seat belt every time you get into your vehicle.

Stay home. If you really don't have to go out, don't. Even if you can drive well in the snow, not everyone else can.

Don't tempt fate: If you don't have somewhere you have to be, watch the snow from indoors.

PERRY HI-WAY HOSE COMPANY UPDATE

Happy New Year!

Greetings from the members of your local volunteer fire department and ambulance service! 2013 was a record setting year with 1273 emergency calls, the most calls ever received in a single year. Our dedicated volunteers were able to answer all but 31 emergency calls for the year resulting in 97.5% of all calls being answered. We had to have mutual aide handle 28 ambulance calls, 2 fire alarms and 1 vehicle accident. The total call breakdown is listed in the chart. If you happen to see one of our members please offer a thank you for all that they do.

The members of the Hose Company have spent many hours at the fire station attending training. Of our 22 members, 18 have enhanced their knowledge and have taken at least 1 professional pro-board certification test over the last year. Pro-Board certifications are national level tests taken by both career (paid) and volunteer firefighters. The test consists of both a written exam and a practical skills test. The testing ensures that successful candidates have obtained and retained the core level of competency in the area being tested. Our 22 members hold over 90 certifications, the most of any department in Erie County. Most of our members hold multiple certifications. We put special emphasis on obtaining certification to Firefighter 1, NFPA 1006 general rescue (Core), vehicle & machinery rescue and Hazardous Material operations level certifications.

The start of 2014 has seen a return of two past members to active status and the addition of four new members. We have also lost two members to paid firefighting jobs, one civilian and one military. Today our membership stands at 26, 6 females and 20 males. We have a constant variation in members and can always use more members. We provide all training and safety equipment needed for the jobs we do. Anyone interested can stop in one of the fire stations on a Monday training night or whenever you see members at the station.

The membership will continue to do their best to provide impeccable service for the residents and visitors to Summit Township in the months and years to come. Help us to help you. Keep fire hydrants near your home cleared of snow and bushes/brush. Make sure your home has the numbers readily visible (4" in size as minimum) and keep your smoke detectors working with fresh batteries.





Sanitary Sewer Extension Project 2010: Proctor, Merle, Melvin, Dorn and New Roads

Bill Paying

There have been a few inquiries regarding online bill paying lately. The Summit Township Sewer Authority (STSA) cannot set up your account for online payment; however, you can still pay your bills online. Call your banking institution and speak to a customer service representative. Most offer free online bill pay service. In order to set this up, you may have to go into the bank. We have quite a few customers that pay their bills online and have the checks sent to our office through this service.

Sanitary Sewer Extension Project 2010: Proctor, Merle, Melvin, Dorn and New Roads

The sanitary sewer construction called for in Contract #1 - Proctor, Merle and Melvin Roads is complete except for the lawn restoration which will proceed this spring. Contract #2 - Dorn Road started late in the fall and work is progressing as the weather permits. Contracts #3 and #4 were held up until the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) issued the Pennsylvania Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permit and an Army Corps of Engineers Section 404 Permit, (called a Joint Permit). The PADEP issued the Joint Permit on October 25th. Then the STSA issued the Notices to Proceed to Amendola Construction for Contract #3 - New Road Sewer Extension and to McLallen Construction for Contract #4 New Road Lift Station on October 31, 2013. The contract documents provide Amendola Construction and McLallen Construction 270 days to complete their work. We believe they will be done much sooner. We will continue to update you via the Township Newsletter.

Connection notices will be issued after the spring thaw. The connection notice will spell out the permit requirements, methods, timing to connect (60 days typical) and cost (\$7,500 for existing homes). We are planning on waiting until all of the construction is complete so we can issue all of the connection notices at the same time. This makes the most sense because all three areas are considered one project. The mailing will depend on the progress of the other three contracts. If any of the other projects are greatly delayed we will consider mailing the connection notices as each project is finished.

If any sewer customer has any questions or concerns, please feel free to call the Authority at 868-4495 or attend a monthly meeting. Check your Township calendar for Sewer Authority meeting dates, (generally the last Thursday of the month, except November and December are one week earlier). The Authority hours are 8:00 AM - Noon and 12:30 - 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday. If you plan to attend a meeting, please call and let us know.

Registration for all children living in the Fort LeBoeuf School District will be held at Waterford Elementary School located at 323 Cherry Street, Waterford, Pa (796-4833). Children entering kindergarten in the fall of 2014 must be five years of age before June 1, 2014.

Registration will be held during the following dates and times: Monday, March 10, 2014 from 11:00 AM- 7:00 PM Tuesday, March 11, 2014 from 11:00 AM- 7:00 PM

Registration will not be complete until the office has a copy of the child's **birth certificate and immunization record**. Please bring a "baby book" with the required data or a doctor's written statement regarding immunization history. **If your immunization record is not updated, please come to registration with the information you have and an updated immunization may be given to the school before classes begin. Proof that you reside in the Fort LeBoeuf School District is required at time of registration. Please have two proofs of residency and one should be your driver license.**

Several forms will be included in packets that will be mailed to parents. The forms include a **personal data sheet, health history and immunization form, PIMS forms, Home Language Survey and Child Find Form** and need to be filled out completely and accurately as these records follow the child through their school years. We ask that all forms be completed and with parents at the time of registration.

We ask that the **kindergarten child be with the parents** so that vision screening can be administered on the day of registration. If the child wears glasses, please have your child wear them on registration day.

Please share this information with a friend or relative who may have a child who is kindergarten age for the fall and lives in the Fort LeBoeuf School District. Please have them call any of our three elementary schools if they have not received a registration packet. **Packets will be mailed out to families on March 3, 2014**.

FROM YOUR SUMMIT TAX COLLECTOR:

Happy New Year!

It is well past the beginning of 2014, but this is the first newsletter of the year.

I hope everyone is well and enduring and possibly enjoying the winter.

All tax bills issued in 2013 and not paid by December 31, 2013 were delinquent and turned over to Erie County Tax Claim on January 1, 2014. I can no longer accept payment for any of these taxes. You will be notified by Erie County Tax Claim as to the status of your delinquency and instructions on how to make payment for these taxes. You can contact them at (814) 451-6206.

The 2014 County-Township (and Street Light if applicable) tax bills will be issued March 1st and should arrive the week of March 3rd. These are for the calendar year January 1 through December 31, 2014. Mills have remained the same as last year for County (4.93) and Summit Township (.59). If you do not receive a tax bill by the 15th of the month, please contact me. PLEASE NOTE: THE LAST ADDRESS OF RECORD THAT THE ASSESSMENT OFFICE HAS, IS WHERE YOUR BILL WILL BE MAILED. If you have an address or ownership change (for a mobile home), you MUST contact the Erie County Assessment office at (814) 451-6225. I cannot make these changes for you. If your forwarding time has expired and you have not changed your mailing address at Assessment, it will eventually be returned to me. I then check the Erie County Website and if it still shows the same mailing address as on your bill, I have nowhere to send your bill. Local Tax Collection Law specifically states "The failure to receive the tax notice shall not relieve any taxpayer from the payment of any taxes imposed by any taxing district, and such taxpayer shall be charged with his taxes as though he had received his notice." The only entity that is permitted to make changes to the tax roll is Erie County Assessment.

The Summit Township Tax Collector collects real estate taxes. This constitutes the County/Township and School tax bills. Berkheimer collects School per capita and Summit LST tax. The School per capita tax is \$10.00 per resident from the age of 18 through 64. If you are 65 on January 1st, you are exempt from the per capita tax. Likewise, if you are a FULL time student you are also exempt. These are the only two exemptions for per capita tax. The per capita list to Berkheimer is maintained by the FLB School District. If you are exempt due to either being over the age of 65 or over 18 but a full time student, you may email your name, address, date of birth and the Bill# or Account# stated on your Berkheimer bill to Kim Heller, Business Manager, FLB School District at hellerk@fortleboeuf.net.
